4. REPORTS

4.1 Superintendent/President

Dr. Spencer reported that the winter session was going quite well, and the campus experienced a smooth start. Dr. Spencer provided up update on Assembly Bill 58 which will provide \$1.5 billion in construction money. A draft of the California Community College strategic plan was

distributed and the three challenges were presented and how the college can relate to those challenges.

4.2 Instruction

Dr. Prystowsky reported on the 2nd week of the winter session and thanked Deans Rude and Parisi for their hard work. An update regarding the visit from the staff of the College of the Redwoods regarding Datatel training was provided. Pat Green, Director of Nursing reported on the White Cap award that was presented at the recent pinning ceremony.

4.3 Student Services

Dr. Lewallen reported on the Datatel training that is scheduled for the next two months. Intense training is planned in January for the MIS staff who operate the system. The college will be sending a team of administrators and faculty to Oakland attend the SSPIRE symposium with is tied to a grant we have received. In addition, on January 28, a team of 10-15 faculty members will be touring the success center of Chaffey College which is tied to our Title V cooperative grant.

4.4 Administrative Services

Mr. Baron reported on his recent visit with Fred Harris, Assistant Vice Chancellor at California Community College Chancellor's office and an auditor, who visited the college regarding the status of the college's fiscal position. He said that there are four levels in this process with the 4th level being the worst place to be, 3rd level requiring continuous monitoring, the 2nd level would need periodic monitoring, and the 1st level would indicate that they are satisfied with the status of the fiscal position and risk. We have been placed on a level 2 status. With the three major concerns being: 1) we do not have a reserve fund that is at a minimum of 5%; 2) we have not yet prepared for the GASB 45 and 47 policies (funded plan for retirement benefits); 3) we are relying on entirely our current revenues to support our current activities. These three issues have put us at a level 2 (periodic monitoring) for this current year. Fred Harris has asked us to prepare a detailed analysis against the criteria and to provide him with a multi-year plan on how the college is preparing to turn those three major issues around in the next couple of years so that the risk is at the lowest level.

4.5 Human Resources

Dr. Schmidt reported on the approximately 21 jobs that are in recruitment. Extensive recruitment efforts for faculty and administrative positions are current underway.

4.6 Governmental Relations

Mr. Greulich reported on the alternative funding bill that did not make it through the legislature which ended up as SB6 which hopefully will become a California initiative requiring 600,000 signatures for the petitions in order to get it on the ballot. This measure will do three important

things: 1) it would separate the colleges from K-12 forever; 2) Colleges will have their own Proposition 98 and 3) it will give the colleges a funding base which would be guaranteed with the percentage remaining the same each year.

Ms. Ontiveros reported on upcoming January 28 Alumni Hall of Fame and Distinguished Service Awards event. The Student Experience fund, with additional funds, will be supporting the Model UN team for their trip to New York as well as the College Singers for their trip to Florida.

Mr. Nelson complimented Duane Buckles and the staff of Restaurant Management for their outstanding job at the Apple Valley City employee's Christmas party at the Fairgrounds. Mr. Nelson also reported on the Spring Valley Lake recall election. Mr. Range reflected on the past year and provided an report for the upcoming year.

Chapter 6

NAMING RECOGNITION

BP 6620

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this policy is to establish the conditions under which recognition may be given to an individual, business, organization or other party as a means of recognizing their contributions to Victor Valley College and/or the Victor Valley College District Foundation.

POLICY

Recognition provided through the naming of any college or district property can only be granted by the Victor Valley College Board of Trustees. A request for such action shall be presented to the Superintendent / President who will facilitate its collegial review and recommendation to the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees will have the full authority to grant or deny such recognition. No guarantee of naming shall be granted to any property named by any entity other than the Board of Trustees including those that may have been recognized prior to the introduction of this policy.

This policy provides the general guidelines for bringing naming recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

CRITERIA FOR NAMING RECOGNITION:

Naming of district property may be considered for any of the following reasons:

- 1. To honor a living person who has made unique, extraordinary or significant personal contribution to the College. That person may not be an employee or trustee at the time of consideration.
- 2. To honor a deceased person who has made a unique, extraordinary or significant personal contribution to the College.
- 3. To honor a group, business or organization that has made a unique, extraordinary or significant contribution to the College.
- 4. To recognize a person, group or business that has donated significant resources through the Victor Valley College District Foundation. The suggested value of donated resources commensurate with naming recognition for campus facilities are attached to this policy as an addendum that may be updated from time to time by the Board of Trustees. Donations do not in themselves guarantee naming rights, but suggest that such recognition shall be appropriately considered.

Recommendations for naming recognition must clearly define and demonstrate the applicable standard for the recognition.

DURATION OF NAMING RECOGNITION:

Naming of district property may be granted by the Board of Trustees as either permanent or for a defined period of time. The recommendation to the trustees shall include the recommended duration of the recognition.

TRANSFERABILITY OF NAMING RECOGNITION:

Naming of a designated piece of district property shall not survive the named property's existence. Should the named property be removed or redesigned for another use the naming recognition shall not automatically be assigned to its replacement or any other like property without the express authorization of the Board of Trustees. A recommendation for the transfer of the naming rights may be presented to the Board of Trustees for consideration at any time within the originally defined recognition period.

SCOPE OF NAMING RECOGNITION:

Naming recognition shall be at a minimum in the form of a standardized plaque prominently placed upon or near the district property to which it applies. To be considered, the recommendation for naming recognition should also clearly define any other requested references including but not limited to printed publications, campus maps, signs, and websites.

PROCEDURE FOR NAMING RECOGNITION:

Any individual or group affiliated with Victor Valley College may submit a written request to the President / Superintendent for granting of naming recognition based on the criteria noted above. The request must include:

- 1. Contact information for a person submitting the request.
- 2. Specific naming recognition requested, including clear identification of the property to be named.
- 3. Written acknowledgement and permission of the person, business or organization to receive the recognition.
- 4. Rationale for the recognition based on criteria set forth in this policy.

Upon receiving a complete written request, the President / Superintendent will facilitate collegial review by a campus committee comprised of at least two representatives of the faculty, classified staff, students, management staff and Foundation. The President / Superintendent will chair this committee. The committee will review the request and submit their recommendation for Board of Trustee action on the request.

The President / Superintendent will then publish the request and supporting recommendation to the Board of Trustees for action.

The Board of Trustees will act upon the request.

The President / Superintendent will notify the appropriate the persons of the action taken by the Board of Trustees and if approved, will assign personnel to implement the naming recognition accordingly.

Chapter 5

Student Records and Directory Information

BP 5040

Reference: Education Code Sections 76200, et seq.; Title 5, Sections 54600, et seq

The superintendent/president shall assure that student records are maintained in compliance with applicable federal and state laws relating to the privacy of student records.

Any currently enrolled or former student of the District has a right of access to any and all student records relating to him or her maintained by the district.

No district representative shall release the contents of a student record to any member of the public without the prior written consent of the student, other than directory information as defined in this policy and information sought pursuant to a court order or lawfully issued subpoena, or as otherwise authorized by applicable federal and state laws.

Students shall be notified of their rights with respect to student records, including the definition of directory information contained here, and that they may limit the information.

Directory information shall include:

- · Student participation in officially recognized activities and sports including weight, height and high school of graduation of athletic team members.
- · <u>Name and</u> dates of attendance, degrees, <u>certificates</u>, and awards received by students, including honors, scholarship awards, athletic awards and Dean's List academic recognition (e.g., Dean's List).

The superintendent/president shall establish procedures regarding student records and directory information.

See Administrative Procedures 5040 and 5045.

TOPIC: AMERICORPS PROGRAM - GRANT AWARD

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT:

The District has received a grant award from the Foundation for Community Colleges for the AmeriCorps Program. The grant will cover the period of December 2005 through October 2008. The AmeriCorps Program is federally funded and is committed to volunteerism and community service. It is intended to provide service learning opportunities to Victor Valley College students interested in pursuing a career in education/teaching. Students who are accepted into the AmeriCorps Program will provide reading and math tutoring to K-6 students at local partner schools. They will also serve as volunteer specialists at selected community sites where they will assist in planning community events and community service activities focusing on literacy development. They will be supervised by site supervisors and evaluated on their performance. At the end of their service, AmeriCorps students (members) will receive an educational award—a cash award from the National AmeriCorps Corporation.

Fiscal Impact: The District will receive \$43,369 annually. 38% in-kind match is required.

San Francisco — The James Irvine Foundation announced today a \$3.5 million grant to MDRC, a nationally recognized social policy research organization, to provide support to nine California Community Colleges as part of a multi-year initiative, which aims to strengthen programs that integrate academic instruction with student support services (such as tutoring and guidance/career counseling) for low-income and racially diverse students. MDRC will provide technical assistance, manage and evaluate the initiative and will help the nine community colleges to identify and document best practices, which can be replicated throughout California schools in the future.

Each of the nine selected community colleges will receive up to \$300,000 in funding for specific programs beginning in January 2006. Funds will be used to enhance and expand integrated program activities, to provide incentives, support services and professional development opportunities for program faculty and staff, and for other assistance to students participating in the programs.

"California's Community Colleges fill a vital role in the state's higher education and workforce preparation systems," said James Canales, President & Chief Executive Officer of The James Irvine Foundation. "This initiative will invest in programs that promise to improve academic outcomes for low-income youth in our community colleges, and will further identify best practices that can be adopted by other colleges across the state."

TOPIC: AGREEMENT, DATATEL EXECUTIVE MENTORING FOR INFORMATION SYSTEMS

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT:

In order to make continued progress toward the successful implementation of the AccessVVC system (Datatel Colleague), the District desires to enter into an agreement with Datatel, Inc. for onsite provision of services related to the implementation. The principal concept driving this arrangement is for Datatel to provide mentoring and assistance to management staff and classified staff in the continued implementation of the system. Due to a number of personnel transitions we do not have a staff that has sufficient Datatel knowledge and experience to overcome a number of problems and issues that are affecting registration functions and related operations. For example, four new classified employees have been hired in the last year with 2 being hired in the last 2 months. While they are highly qualified information technology professionals, they have little direct experience specifically with Datatel. Onsite training courses are being provided to the MIS management and classified staff over the next several months. However, during this "training" period, there is a critical need to have someone onsite with a high level of knowledge and experience to help us solve a number of issues and problems immediately.

The proposed agreement includes specific deliverables from the vendor (see section B.2. of the proposed agreement). Mr. Bob Chappelle, Manager of Services Sales – Datatel, is here to discuss the proposed agreement and answer questions.

Fiscal Impact: Budgeted item, approximately \$141,500 for 2005-06 fiscal year, approximately \$84,900 for 2006-07 fiscal year.

TOPIC: AGREEMENT, FACTS MANAGEMENT COMPANY

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT:

The District desires to enter into an agreement with FACTS Management Company to provide fee payment options for students. Currently, students are not dropped from classes for nonpayment of fees. They are blocked from enrolling the subsequent term if debts are not cleared. However, this model has not been effective. Effective with the Summer 2006 term, the District will implement a procedure for dropping students from classes for nonpayment of fees. A survey of all colleges in Region 9 revealed that every college (except VVC) has a procedure for dropping students for nonpayment of fees. This change is being communicated to students through the college web site, the winter/spring schedule of classes, and a newsletter being sent direct mail to all enrolled students. Essentially, students will have 2 options to avoid being dropped from classes for nonpayment of fees. Option 1 is to pay all fees in full. Option 2 will be to utilize a payment plan. FACTS Management Company manages payment plans for students for a modest fee of \$20 per semester. There is no cost to the District for the FACTS Management Company services.

Fiscal Impact: The current debt balance from uncollected student fees will not continue to grow.

- 1. <u>SERVICES:</u> The Company agrees to provide the Institution with payment-processing services for payment of tuition, books, and other incidental fees owed to the Institution by the Institution's clients (parents or students, hereinafter referred to as Responsible Parties), as set forth in this Agreement. Services for payment of housing costs are expressly excluded from the terms of this Agreement. The Institution must enter into a separate Professional Services Agreement for such services if it wishes to provide payment plans for housing. Services provided include information management tools for the Institution and Responsible Parties. The Company will also provide the Institution with the FACTS Program Handbook and training opportunities to help the Institution effectively implement the program.
- 2. <u>PAYMENT OPTIONS:</u> On behalf of the Institution, FACTS will provide Responsible Parties with payment options and services as selected by the Institution as part of this Agreement. The Company will make every effort to inform the Institution of regulatory changes that affect any payment or service options selected.
- 3. CREDIT CARD OPTION: If the Institution elects to offer a credit card payment option to Responsible Parties, the credit card transactions will be processed by FACTS or through a third-party service provider. If processed by a third-party service provider, FACTS, by agreement with that provider, acts as the provider's customer-service agent. Any chargebacks received will be passed through to the Institution.
- 4. <u>CHANGES TO AGREEMENTS:</u> Changes made to the budgeted amount are to be made through the Institution, which is responsible for obtaining written or similarly authenticated authorization from Responsible Parties at least four business days prior to the next payment date. In the absence of written authorization, the Institution may change a budgeted amount by notifying Responsible Parties at least ten calendar days prior to the next payment date.
- 5. CUSTODIAL ACCOUNTS: The Institution appoints the Company as its sole third-party agent to collect payments owed to the Institution as set forth in this Agreement, to process and hold these funds, and to transfer and disburse collected funds to the Institution. It is understood that FACTS is acting only as a custodial agent for collection and disbursement of these funds, and does not guarantee payments or provide for the collection of payments upon default by Responsible Parties. FACTS is responsible for following applicable ACH and credit card association rules in cooperation with the Institution. All successfully collected payments shall be deposited into a custodial account (for ACH) or a settlement account (for credit card). Each successfully collected payment is FDIC insured for up to \$100,000.00 per Responsible Party or is otherwise guaranteed by FACTS' depository bank. These funds are held in custody with FACTS for the Responsible Parties and, upon remittance by FACTS to the Institution's bank account, shall become the property of the corresponding Institution, less applicable fees. Any interest earned on these funds while in the custodial account is payable to FACTS
- 6. <u>INSTITUTION BANKING INFORMATION:</u> The Institution is to provide banking information for the ACH deposit of its funds. The FACTS preferred method for receiving banking information is for the Institution to provide FACTS with a check (marked "VOID") for the account into which funds are to be deposited. If the depository account is a savings account or if a voided check is unavailable, FACTS will accept a bank reference letter written on bank letterhead that includes the account holder name, the routing number, account number, and type of account (checking or savings). The Institution hereby authorizes FACTS to initiate credit entries to the account indicated and to credit the same to such account. The Institution acknowledges that the origination of ACH transactions to their account must comply with the provisions of U.S. law. This authorization is to remain in full force and effect until FACTS has received written notification from the Institution of its termination or change in banking in such time and in such manner as to afford FACTS a reasonable opportunity to act on it.
- 7. **REMITTANCE:** FACTS will automatically deposit the Institution's funds into the Institution's bank account according to the following schedule:
 - a. ACH: Funds collected via ACH on the 5th of the month are remitted on the 15th of the same month. Funds collected on the 20th are remitted on the last business day of the month. If the 15th falls on a weekend or banking holiday, the funds will be deposited on the <u>following</u> business day.
 - b. CREDIT CARD: Funds collected via credit card on the 5th of the month are remitted on the 10th of the same month. Funds collected on the 20th are remitted on the 25th. If either deposit date falls on a weekend or banking holiday, the funds will be deposited on the <u>following</u> business day.
 - c. <u>E-CASHIER DOWN AND FULL PAYMENTS:</u> Funds collected via e-Cashier (the company's online enrollment product) for down and full payments will be deposited three (3) business days after the payment is processed if received by credit card and five (5) business days after the payment is processed if received by ACH.

8. **FEES:**

- ENROLLMENT FEE: A nonrefundable enrollment fee is charged for each agreement period and is based upon the number of payments selected for the agreement period. If the entire balance due is not paid within the agreement period or twelve (12) months, whichever period is shorter, an agreement is in renewal. On the renewal date of such an agreement, FACTS may assess a new enrollment fee. It is understood that FACTS is not obligated to process payments unless the enrollment fee has been paid by the Responsible Party or the Institution. The enrollment fee is fixed for the initial term of this Agreement but may be renegotiated at any time thereafter if there is an increase in tuition and fees.
- b. <u>RETURNED PAYMENT FEE:</u> For all payment options *except* down and full payments through e-Cashier, a \$25 returned payment fee will be assessed to the Responsible Party if a payment attempt fails. Returned payment fees are assessed for each payment attempt that is returned. The Institution has no liability for returned payment fees. Returned payment fees are subject to change in future academic terms.
- c. FEE RETURNS: If any fees are returned, they will be reattempted, as applicable.
- 9. <u>INSTAFACTS</u>: The Institution agrees not to disclose InstaFACTS User IDs and Passwords to unauthorized personnel, and it will notify FACTS immediately if an unauthorized person obtains access to them. The Institution will also notify FACTS if an InstaFACTS User ID and Password is no longer needed by a representative of the Institution.
- 10. PRIVACY POLICY: FACTS provides information management services and business solutions to educational institutions, their students, and the students' families (or guardians). In the course of providing these services, FACTS receives nonpublic personal information about these students and families. This information may be gathered from agreements, applications, and other forms, as well as any history of transactions with us. FACTS does not disclose nonpublic personal information except as permitted by law. We may, as permitted by law, share information relating to transactions with these individuals, with their educational institution, as well as with our parent company, Nelnet, Inc., and its affiliated companies. We may also share this information as necessary to complete a transaction in the ordinary course of business or as may be required under applicable law. To the extent we possess nonpublic personal information that is not a result of our transactions with the individuals, we do not share this non-transactional information. To protect nonpublic personal information from access by unauthorized parties, FACTS maintains physical, procedural, and electronic safeguards.
- 11. ARBITRATION: Upon the demand of any party, any dispute concerning the parties' duties or liabilities shall be resolved by binding arbitration in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. Arbitration proceedings shall be administered by the American Arbitration Association (AAA) or such other administrator as the parties shall mutually agree upon in accordance with the AAA Commercial Arbitration Rules. All disputes submitted to arbitration shall be resolved in accordance with the Federal Arbitration Act (Title 9 of the United States Code), notwithstanding any conflicting choice of law provision. The arbitration shall be conducted at a location in Lincoln, Nebraska selected by the AAA or other administrator. All statutes of limitation applicable to any dispute shall apply to any arbitration proceeding. All discovery activities shall be expressly limited to matters directly relevant to the dispute being arbitrated. Judgment upon any award rendered in arbitration may be entered in any court having jurisdiction.
- 12. <u>TERM, TERMINATION, AND RENEWAL:</u> The term of this contract shall be three years from the date signed. It will automatically renew every three years thereafter unless either party cancels it in writing sixty (60) days in advance of the three-year renewal date. The Institution agrees not to contract with any other payment-plan provider or tuition-management service while this Agreement is in effect.

TOPIC: NON RESIDENT TUITION FEE

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT:

Each year community colleges are required to establish a nonresident tuition fee rate for the next fiscal year. Using the attached worksheet, the options for establishing this rate include:

- 1. the statewide basis (\$160), or
- 2. the district basis (\$154)

Nonresident students pay the regular registration fee of \$26 per unit in addition to the nonresident tuition.

Fiscal Impact: The district collects approximately \$140,000 annually in nonresident tuition fees.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the nonresident tuition rate of \$160 (statewide basis). This nonresident tuition fee will be effective for the fall semester 2006.

TOPIC: AGREEMENT - PUBLIC ECONOMICS, INC.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT:

The College participates in several entitlements to pass-through payments in eight redevelopment project areas for the cities of Apple Valley, Hesperia, and Victorville, as well as the Victor Valley Redevelopment Authority (for former George Air Force Base). The funds come to the District for facilities improvement purposes based on complex formulas and legal parameters set by statute. Potentially large sums of funding over the next twenty years may be owed to the District as part of these entitlements. The firm of Public Economics, Inc. has expertise in the analysis of redevelopment entitlement contracts. This agreement is for Phase I of three phases, providing the District with a complete analysis of the entitlements, making projections of revenues and auditing the various entities for compliance with the entitlement agreements. This will assist in ensuring that the District is receiving the correct amounts of revenue. This first phase of the project consists of providing background information, analysis of District entitlements and review of redevelopment payment accounting at the San Bernardino County Office.

The district wishes to enter into an agreement with Public Economics, Inc. to perform the Phase I services as detailed in the attached agreement.



Dear Mr. Baron,

At your request, and on behalf of Public Economics, Inc. ("PEI"), I am pleased to submit this work program to provide redevelopment consulting services to Victor Valley Community College District ("District"). Please find enclosed two originals of PEI's standard consulting agreement ("Agreement"), including Scope of Work (Exhibit A) and Budget (Exhibit B).

Background

In work previously completed for the District in 1999, PEI determined the District had actual entitlements to pass-through payments in eight redevelopment project areas ("Projects") involving redevelopment agencies ("RDAs") for the cities of Apple Valley, Hesperia, and Victor Valley, as well as the Victor Valley Redevelopment Authority (for former George Air Force Base), including:

- 5 contractual entitlements in pre-1994 Projects, per pass-through agreements pursuant to former Health and Safety Code ("HSC") 33401
- 3 statutory AB 1290 entitlements in post-1994 Projects pursuant to HSC 33607.5

Since 1999 PEI is aware of the following additional actual or potential RDA entitlements within the boundaries of the District:

- 2 AB 1290 entitlements in new Projects pursuant to HSC 33607.5
- Potential AB 1290 entitlements in pre-1994 Projects pursuant to HSC 33607.7 and SB 211
- Potential "2 percent" entitlements in pre-1994 Projects pursuant to former HSC 33676 and Santa Ana Unified School District v. Orange County Development Agency, 90 Cal. App. 4th 404 (2001) ("Santa Ana Decision")

In 1999 PEI projected the facilities portion of future pass-through payments from the eight existing Projects at \$20.4 to \$82.6 million over 45 years, assuming growth in assessed value ("AV") of between 2 percent and 5 percent per year. AV growth since 1999 has probably been significantly higher than previously assumed. Additional RDA entitlements since 1999 have also undoubtedly added to the amount of future payments previously projected.

Scope of Work, Phasing, and Work Products

The attached Scope of Work includes tasks needed to update PEI's previous work, and to help the District protect, maximize, and utilize all its RDA entitlements. As shown in Exhibit A, the Scope of Work includes nine tasks, which PEI proposes to complete in three phases. Phase 1 includes Tasks 1 through 3, Phase 2 includes Tasks 4 through 6, and Phase 3 includes Task 7 through 9. Work products include various written reports, technical documents, etc., as also indicated in Exhibit A

Proposed Budget

As shown in Exhibit B, at this time PEI requests a Phase 1 Budget allowance of \$7,500. Budgets for subsequent phases will be provided at a later time, since they depend on PEI's findings in each phase. However, if PEI can complete any of the phases for less than the corresponding budget, the District will be billed only for the work performed, and/or the remaining budget for that phase will be applied to a subsequent phase.

Moreover, the cost of services rendered under the Agreement may be paid or reimbursed from the proceeds of redevelopment pass-through payments, i.e., without imposing any burden on the District's general fund. In addition, with the approval of bond counsel, the cost of services may be reimbursed from the proceeds of District financings secured or repaid with such payments.

EXHIBIT A Redevelopment Consulting Services Scope of Work

The Scope of Work includes the following tasks needed to identify, quantify, protect, and maximize the District's entitlements to payments from redevelopment agencies ("RDAs"). These tasks include the following:

1. Background Information

Provide background information to District staff and/or the District's Board of Trustees about redevelopment and pass-through entitlements in general, and due diligence requirements needed to protect, maximize, and utilize redevelopment payments.

Work Products: Prepare and provide written materials. Presentations to District staff or Board.

2. Analysis of District Entitlements

Confirm District entitlements to payments from all redevelopment projects ("Projects") within the District. This includes:

- Determine overlap between District boundaries and all cities and unincorporated areas within which Projects may be located
- Obtain copies of pass-through agreements or other contractual entitlements, whether from the District or from individual RDAs, and analyze evaluate, and summarize such agreements
- Obtain unpublished data from San Bernardino County Auditor-Controller ("A-C") for the District portion of each Project area (including tax rate area level for "partial projects," if any), including but not limited to:
 - √ District share of general property tax levy
 - √ Base year assessed value
 - √ Current year assessed value
 - ✓ Gross tax increment from 1 percent basis levy
- Determine amounts and sources of all redevelopment payments received by District (or deposited into RDA fund on District's behalf) since July 1, 1999, and review accompanying RDA correspondence or documentation (if any)
- Make preliminary determination regarding potential entitlement payment issues
- Provide District staff with written information concerning nature of District entitlements

Work Product: Memorandum report of preliminary findings, including tabular summary of District's actual and potential redevelopment entitlements by Project and type, and relevant Project/entitlement parameters

3. Redevelopment Payment Accounting

Work with District, San Bernardino County Office of Education, and/or County A-C as needed to facilitate segregation and proper accounting and reporting of all redevelopment payments to District, using 47.5 percent of AB 1290 payments for revenue level offset as required by HSC 33507.5. Inform District regarding utilization of each source of redevelopment payments consistent with corresponding statutory and/or contractual requirements, including but not limited to deferred maintenance, lease or purchase of relocatable classrooms, General Fund reimbursement for past facility expenditures, debt service on existing or future lease purchase financings, etc..

Work Products: Correspondence, budget-related reports

4. Past Payment Entitlements

Determine amount of District pass-through entitlements for FYs 2000-01 through 2004-05 (or most recent prior year, depending on availability of payment data). Determinations will be based on unpublished data from the County A-C for the District portion of each Project (at the tax rate area level for "partial projects," if any)

Compare District entitlements to amounts actually received by District to determine extent of non-compliance by RDAs for year in question. Analyze and evaluate potential reasons for non-compliance, and review with District staff. If underpayment amounts are sufficient, at direction of District staff, repeat process for additional prior years.

Work Products: Work sheets, correspondence

5. Future Payments

Prepare projections of future payments to District from all redevelopment entitlements, based on assessed valuations in FY 2005-06, and estimate the net bonding capacity (i.e., net construction proceeds) of projected future payments. Provide District staff with written information concerning nature of District entitlements, and due diligence requirements needed to protect, maximize, and utilize redevelopment payments

Work Products: Cash flow projections, correspondence

6. Official Report

Prepare formal written report incorporating final findings, including:

As set forth in the Agreement, costs to Consultant of incidental expenses pertaining to the Scope of Work are included in the Budget and will be charged on a cost recovery basis. Unless advised to the contrary by District, Consultant will submit a single monthly invoice for all services. Each monthly invoice will show specific services provided and expenses incurred. Services and expenses incurred for which separate budgets have been identified above will be shown separately.

Additional Work (if any) defined in Exhibit A will also be clearly identified in each monthly invoice. Additional Work will be payable on a time and materials basis using the hourly rates shown above. The cost of services rendered under the Agreement may be paid or reimbursed from the proceeds of redevelopment pass-through payments; or with the approval of bond counsel, from the proceeds of District financings secured or repaid with such payments.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between Public Economics, Inc., hereinafter referred to as "Consultant," and Victor Valley Community College District, hereinafter referred to as "District."

WHEREAS, District is in need of special services and advice in financial, economic, facilities, or administrative matters; and

WHEREAS, such services and advice are not available at no cost from public agencies; and

WHEREAS, Consultant is specially trained, experienced and competent to provide the special services and advice required; and

WHEREAS, such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, Consultant and District agree as follows:

- 1. Consultant will provide the special services and advice to District and will deliver the work products related thereto, as described in the Scope of Work attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- 2. Consultant will perform said services as an independent contractor and not as an employee of District. Consultant shall be under the control of District as to the result to be accomplished and not as to the means or manner by which such result is to be accomplished. This Agreement will continue in effect until the services provided for have been performed and work has been completed or until otherwise terminated by either party.
- 3. District will prepare and furnish to Consultant upon request such information as is reasonably necessary for the performance of Consultant under this Agreement.
- 4. District shall pay Consultant for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with the Proposed Budget, attached hereto as Exhibit B.

The budget and hourly fee schedule set forth in Exhibit B may be adjusted downward based on potential joint provision of services and advice described in Exhibit A to additional school or other public entities besides District. Such joint services and advice will be provided by Consultant only with advance permission of District, and on terms acceptable to District.

In addition to payment of fees, District shall reimburse Consultant in accordance with the Proposed Budget for that portion of reasonable expenses that have been allocated to District, including, but not limited to, cost to Consultant of travel, word processing (at \$35 per hour), photocopying, courier services, database services or materials, and other reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

Consultant shall submit invoices to District on a monthly basis showing specific services provided and expenses incurred. Such invoices are due and payable upon receipt.

Except for services for which a fixed fee has been identified, all services shall be subject to application of the hourly fee schedule set forth in Exhibit B, unless such schedule has been superseded by another fee schedule acceptable to District which modifies such hourly rates.

- 5. District may at any time for any reason terminate this Agreement and compensate Consultant only for services rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Consultant. The notice shall be deemed given when received. Notwithstanding the above, Consultant shall also be compensated for time subsequently spent on District's behalf in court appearances, testimony, deposition, or discovery proceedings.
- 6. Consultant agrees to and shall hold harmless, defend and indemnify District, its officers, agents, and employees from every claim or demand and every liability or loss, damage or expense which may be incurred by reason of Consultant's negligent performance pursuant to this Agreement except for liability for damages referred to above which result from negligent or willful misconduct of District, its officers, employees or agents. Except to the extent covered by insurance, the liability of Consultant for any and all claims related to this Agreement, including any cause of action in contract, tort or strict liability, and including an obligation to indemnify District, shall not exceed the total amount of payments made to Consultant under this Agreement.
 - 7. This Agreement is not assignable without written consent of the parties hereto.
- 8. Consultant shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances including workers' compensation.
- 9. If any employee of Consultant is an employee of another public agency, Consultant certifies that such employee of Consultant will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 10. District acknowledges that Consultant may at various times perform services for other public agencies with jurisdiction over the same territory as District and for certain private parties interested in development projects within the boundaries of District. Consultant agrees to make appropriate disclosure of such relationships and the parties agree that nothing in this Agreement is intended to imply that Consultant is a "public official," "participating in a governmental decision" or has a "financial interest" as such terms are used in California Government Code Section 87100.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VICTOR VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT TO ADOPT THE AUXILIARY GYMNASIUM PROJECT LOCATED ON THE CAMPUS OF THE CURRENT VICTOR VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE LOCATED AT 18422 BEAR VALLEY ROAD, VICTORVILLE, CALIFORNIA, SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY

WHEREAS, The District proposes to construct an Auxiliary Gymnasium on the campus of the current Victor Valley Community College to accommodate students in attendance at the college and enhance educational opportunities for those students; and

WHEREAS, prior to beginning construction of school facilities exceeding a specified size of 10,000 square feet, the District must comply with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and

WHEREAS, an Initial Study for the Project ("Initial Study") has been prepared based on the Preliminary Environmental Assessment and Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for the Victor Valley Community College District to ascertain whether the Auxiliary Gymnasium Project may have significant effects on the environment;

WHEREAS, the Initial Study has indicated that the Project may have one or more potentially significant impacts on the environment, but that each potentially significant impact can be reduced to a level of insignificance by the adoption of the mitigation measures incorporated in the project; thus District staff have determined that a Negative Declaration should be prepared and a Monitoring Program implemented for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Negative Declaration was prepared pursuant to CEQA and the State CEQA Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, the District, as the lead agency for the Project, provided copies of the draft Negative Declaration ("Draft Negative Declaration") and Initial Study to the public for review and comment pursuant to Public Resources Code Sections 21091 and 20192; and

WHEREAS, the District received, considered and responded to comments received from the public and other interested agencies regarding the Negative Declaration, which comments are attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the Board has carefully reviewed the Negative Declaration and all other relevant information contained in the record for the Project.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of the College District hereby finds, determines, declares, orders and resolves as follows:

<u>Section 1 – Recitals</u>. That all of the recitals set forth above are true and correct.

Section 2 – Compliance with CEQA. That the Board reviewed and considered the information contained in the Final Negative Declaration including without limitation, the Draft Negative Declaration, Initial Study, comments from the public and interested agencies, and the District's responses to such comments. The Board hereby makes the following specific findings with respect to the Final Negative Declaration:

- (a) The Negative Declaration prepared for the Project contains a complete and accurate reporting of the environmental impacts associated with the Project; and
- (b) The Negative Declaration has been completed in compliance with CEQA and the State CEQA Guidelines; and
- (c) On the basis of the whole record before the Board, including the Initial Study and any comments received, the Project may have one or more significant impacts on the environment, but each potentially significant impact can be reduced to a level of insignificance by the adoption of the mitigation measures incorporated in the Project, as shown on Exhibit "A" hereto.

- (d) Pursuant to Education Code Section 17213, the School District has given notice to and consulted with the Mojave Air Quality Management District ("Air Quality District") requesting identification of facilities located within one-fourth of a mile of the School Site which might reasonably be anticipated to emit hazardous air emissions or acutely hazardous materials, substances, or waste; and
- (e) Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21181.8 and Education Code

 Section 17213(a), the proposed school project is not the site of a current or
 former hazardous waste disposal site or solid waste disposal site, a hazardous
 substance release site, a site which contains one or more pipelines which
 carries hazardous substances, materials, or wastes, or a site that is within 500
 feet of a freeway or busy traffic corridor that would create a health hazard or
 exposure to high level pollutants.
- (f) The Board does hereby adopt the proposed Negative Declaration with planned mitigation measures along with a Monitoring Program, attached hereto as Exhibit "A".
- (g) The Negative Declaration and Initial Study reflect the independent judgment of the District; and
- (h) Any mitigation measures added ("Mitigation Measures") to the Negative

 Declaration subsequent to the circulation of the Draft Negative Declaration are
 either minor changes to the Project and do not result in a fundamental
 reorganization of the Negative Declaration, and/or the purpose of the
 Mitigation Measures are to reduce the effects on the environment that were
 already identified in the Draft Negative Declaration as insignificant, and
 further that the Mitigation Measures do not have the potential to have a
 significant impact upon the environment; and

(i) That any mitigation measures which have been changed or substituted subsequent to the circulation of the Draft Negative Declaration are equivalent or more effective in mitigating the environmental impacts than the prior mitigation measures, and that the change and/or substitution of such mitigation measures and not itself cause any potentially significant effect upon the environment.

NEGATIVE DECLARATION, MITIGATIONS & MONITORING PROGRAM

Negative Declaration:

It has been determined that based on the current authorized use approved for this property, the above project will not have a significant effect on the environment for the following reasons:

- 1. It does not affect any rare or endangered species;
- 2. It does not cause interference with the movement of any resident migratory fish or wildlife species.
- 3. It does not breach any published national, state, or local standards relating to solid waste or littler control.
- 4. It does not result in detrimental effects on air or water quality or on ambient noise levels for adjoining areas.
- 5. It does not involve the possibility of contaminating the public water system or adversely affecting ground water.
- 6. It could not cause substantial flooding, erosion or siltation; and
- 7. The project will not individually or collectively have an adverse effect on wildlife species, as defined in Section 711.2 of the California Fish and Game Code.

Mitigations:

- 1. Site grading and preparation will be designed to minimize soil disruptions and surface runoff in accordance with the approved grading plans. Necessary compaction testing will be conducted and compaction standards met pursuant to DSA standards and the utilization of identified options to correct soil settlement differentials.
- 2. Building structures will be designed to withstand the maximum credible and probable ground acceleration in accordance with Title 24 Building Standards. Liquefaction concerns will be addressed by utilizing the identified options by the architects and soil engineers and within Title 24 Building Standards.
- 3. Dust generated during construction will be controlled by water application in accordance with Mojave Air Quality Management standards.
- 4. Noise attenuation will be included in the design. Compliance with local noise standards will be followed during construction. Additionally, the site will comply with State of California, Department of education Noise Guidelines.

EXHIBIT "A" (continued)

- 5. All lighting will be designed to reduce glare through diffusion.
- 6. A "safe route to school" package will be maintained and implemented. The District shall also review and modify as necessary, the walking routes (if any) for students to assure the safety of all concerned.
- 7. Fire hydrant, fire alarms, sprinkler systems and firewalls will be installed as required by the State Fire Marshal.
- 8. Fire truck access and adequate turning radius for fire equipment will be maintained.
- 9. The additional facilities will utilize current principles of energy and water conservation, including but not limited to, water-conserving plumbing fixtures, energy efficient lighting systems, double-glazed windows, and insulation.
- 10. The new buildings will be submitted to the Division of the State Architect for approval and will comply with all criteria and regulations affecting educational facilities including geological/seismic design safety features required by Title 24 (field Act) and current building codes.
- 11. A District mitigation-monitoring program for all mitigation measures will be implemented.

Monitoring Plan:

A District mitigation-monitoring program encompassing all of the mitigation measures identified will be implemented under the supervision of Steve Garcia, Director of Facilities for the Victor Valley Community College District or his designee. Documentation of the implementation of each of the mitigations will be created and maintained by the District.



The Victor Valley Community College District proposes to construct a new gymnasium facility within the boundaries of the current Victor Valley Community College Campus to enhance the physical education needs of students.

8. Initial Study

The Victor Valley Community College District proposes to enhance educational opportunities for students with special needs. (Site is depicted in Attachment 1).

The proposed project is needed to provide physical education facilities to meet educational needs of community college students. This proposed gymnasium would be constructed to serve college students from the residential community surrounding the site and within the Victor Valley Community College District boundary.

Hydrologue, Inc. has performed a Phase I - Environmental Site Assessment and CHI Incorporated has completed the Geotechnical Investigation for the proposed project. This company specializes in completing these environmental and geotechnical analysis. These reports are provided in Attachments 3 and 4.

Pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code Section 21000, etc. seq. (CEQA), this action has been determined to be a "Project". This Initial Study has been prepared to ascertain whether the effects, if any, of the Project may have a significant adverse effect on the environment. The District is acting as the Lead Agency for the Project.

9. Description of the Project

The new school facility will consist of a permanent building that will serve as a gymnasium with a dance studio, provisions for an adaptive physical education program, showers, offices and a classroom.

A District and community goal is to provide permanent modern educational school facilities to accommodate students who have been identified with problems requiring alternative educational opportunities and to serve their needs.

The implementation of this project is scheduled to be completed and occupied within the next 1 years.

10. Surrounding Land Use and Settings

The site is located on the Victor Valley Community College Campus, 18422 Bear Valley Road Victorville, CA 92392. The site is west of Mojave Fishery Road and south and east of East Campus Road.

The topography currently vacant undeveloped land is relatively flat It is sometimes used for overflow parking during campus events. The proposed site is situated at approximately 2830 feet above mean sea level.

There are no endangered plant/animal, cultural, historical or scenic aspects to be considered beyond this discussion.

11. Other Public Agencies Whose Approval Is Required

The proposed project is responsive to the City of Victorville. The City recognizes the need for modern school facilities to serve the numbers of students living within the Victor Valley area.

The California Department of Education has adopted standards for selecting school sites and developing school plans. These standards include the numbers or acres for the planned student enrollment, parking and drop off provisions, proximity to earthquake faults, fault traces and liquefaction conditions. As well as high voltage power lines, airports, flood inundation areas, hazardous wastes, toxic soils, and air emissions, and hazardous traffic conditions and other standards related to the health, safety of students and staff and educational adequacy. Each site utilized by a school district for a school must meet these standards and if State funds are used to acquire the site or build the school, the California Department of Education must approve the site.

The Division of the State Architect of the State of California requires submission and approval of the plans for the grading and design of the school site to ensure compliance with Title 24 of the Building Code, Handicapped Access, and State Fire Codes.

The California Department of Toxic Substance Control requires submission of the Phase I Environmental Assessment document for review of the department and could require that a Preliminary Environmental Assessment be completed to determine whether the release of hazards materials or the release of such material may pose a threat to public health or the environment exists on the site. Should the DTSC determine that a PEA is required the district will complete such assessment and implement any mitigations as may be required.

DISCUSSION OF ISSUES

L AESTHETICS

- (Item a.) Since no scenic views or highways currently exist nearby, this project will not impact them.
- (Item b.)- There are no substantial damage scenic resources anticipated to trees, rock outcroppings, and historic buildings within the state highway system.
- Item c.) The proposed project will result in utilizing a vacant area within a current school site. The new construction will improve the current vacant area with a new gymnasium and landscaping and does not contemplate removing any trees.

(Item c.)-To minimize the potential impacts from light and glare to a level of insignificance, the project will have low-level lighting around campus. Buildings are located within the inner campus and will only partially be seen from the adjacent street. The color scheme of the buildings will be unobtrusive with landscaping around the campus to reduce any further impacts of light or glare.

These odors will be confined to the construction period of the project and would not be significant.

IV. BIOLOGICAL RESOURCES

An assessment of the site by the district and Hydrologue Inc. have concluded that no endangered, threatened or rare plant or animal species are known to exist on or near the proposed site since this project is being constructed in the heavily traveled and occupied middle of the current college campus. No other established native resident or migratory wildlife corridors or native wildlife nurseries are present on the project site or in its vicinity.

V. CULTURAL RESOURCES

No unique or historical resources are known to exist on the subject site. The proposed project will not disturb or affect any paleontologic, archaeological, historical resources or affect unique ethnic cultural values or religious uses, and will not disturb any human remains.

VI. GEOLOGICAL PROBLEMS

(Items a, b, and c) - The results of the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment and Geotechnical Investigations report that no known faults traverse at or near the site, the site is not located within an area designated as a Special Studies Zone, and the soil conditions at the site indicated that the site is not situated within a potential liquefaction zone and is not particularly susceptible to liquefaction. The closest fault is the North Frontal Fault, approximately 6.3 miles southeast of the site. The next closest fault is the Cleghorn Fault and the Helendale Fault, which are between 11 and 13 miles. Southwest and Northeast of the site. There are abundant active and potential faults located in Southern California that are capable of generating earthquakes that could affect the area. Building structures will be designed in accordance with Seismic Zone 4 minimum standards as described in the California Building Code and Title 24 Building Standards. Plumbing and utility services will be connected with flexible connections and/or provided with convenient shutoffs to mitigate against severe ground shaking.

The site is not susceptible to lateral spreading or landsliding associated with a seismic event of nearby faults and the potential for liquefaction is negligible. No groundwater was identified nor is the site located within a floodplain.

VII. HAZARDS

(Item a) The proposed construction of the gymnasium will not have a significant risk of accidental explosion or release of hazardous substances. No combustible materials will be present on the site.

(Item b-d) Hydrologue, Inc conducted a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment on the site, October 26. 2005. Based on the historic use of the property from at least 1954 until 1975, it was recommended by Hydrologue that the District pursue a program of soil sampling and analysis to assess the presence of chemically persistent agricultural chemicals. All soil samplings should generally conform to DTSC guidelines for assessment of former agricultural properties discrete soil samples should be collected and analyzed for organochlorine pesticides and CAM metals.

(Item e-f) No Public Airport or private airstrip is located near the site

(Item g) The college will continue to serve as a designated evacuation center or relief shelter during emergency situations. College District personnel will coordinate with appropriate local public agencies and assist with these types of operations. Therefore, the new construction at the college is considered a positive impact with regard to an Emergency Response Plan.

Item h.) Fire hazards are minimized since any current landscape will be watered and regularly maintained.

VIII. WATER

Item a.) The proposed design of the gym will be planned to take into consideration the natural sloping and drainage patterns at the site. The facilities will be constructed so that ground surface water flows away from the buildings. There will be no significant change in nor increase in water patterns since the site will be minimally graded which will not cause a change in the rate or amount of surface runoff.

Item b-e.) The drainage and grading plans will be designed to ensure consistency in discharge and direction of surface waters and comply with the Storm Water Management Program General Permit Guidelines. Flood control drainage structures/patterns will be constructed, as may be necessary, resulting in having no impact on the environment.

IX. LAND USE AND PLANNING

(Item c) - The land use of the site will not change from its existing use as college campus. Development of the proposed project will expand and improve the quality of the facilities at the school and services to students. The site will provide for an educational setting and facility within a new housing development and provide for a compatible with the surrounding residential zoning. The proposed project will be consistent with the current zoning.

X. ENERGY AND MINERAL RESOURCES

The new facilities will utilize the most current principles of energy conservation that reduce waste and inefficiency in energy usage. These methods may include, but are not necessarily limited to; water-conserving plumbing fixtures, moisture sensitive irrigation sensors, cogeneration systems, energy efficient lighting, heating, and air conditioning systems, double-glazed windows, and appropriate insulation. Fuel and energy consumption during construction will be minor, thus requiring no mitigation measures.

The proposed project will not result in a substantial increase in nonrenewable mineral resources since limited quantities would be used for the relatively small size of the project. The energy sources used during construction and occupancy will be water, gas, electricity and other energy supplies necessary to serve the facility.

XI. POPULATION AND HOUSING

Since the land is currently utilized for college purposes, therefore, no significant existing housing would be displaced. Colleges are part of the infrastructure necessary for the community to provide educational and recreational facilities.

XII. PUBLIC SERVICES

(Item a.) The Victorville Fire Department currently serves the project site. To minimize the impact on fire protection services, the project will include fire alarms, firewalls and dampers, and detector devices in accordance with the State Fire Marshal requirements. Fire truck access on campus and adequate turning radius for fire equipment will also be maintained and incorporated into the design. Emergency evacuation programs will be approved by the fire agency.

(Item b.) The Victorville Police Department will provide law enforcement protection. The development of this new addition to the school is projected to minimally impact the police services and will be similar to the impacts that the existing schools have on the Sheriff's Department. The District will continue to work with local law enforcement agencies with regard to student supervision. The school will be locked during off-hours and the site lighted to reduce vandalism, theft, or other incidents. The project is a small part of the community development and will generate less than a significant impact on police services.

The Victorville community and surrounding area will benefit from the new addition to the current campus, which will result in a positive impact on the educational program for the community to facilitate the quality of life.

The District will assume responsibility for maintenance of the college grounds and facilities. The City of Victorville Department of Public Works will provide maintenance of the adjacent streets. No significant impacts on maintenance will occur.

XIII. RECREATION

The proposed project will provide for after school and weekend recreational activities on the site, which will enhance the recreation opportunities for this new housing community.

XIV. TRANSPORTATION / CIRCULATION

(Item a) - The proposed new construction is designed to serve college students who are living within the District boundaries. When completed the new facilities will serve as a neighborhood facility resulting in a minimal amount of additional vehicular traffic activity and will be mostly generated by students and staff driving to and from school. A separate drop-off area with on-site staff and visitor parking will also be utilized to accommodate the expected vehicles using the school.

(Item e) Many students will continue to drive to the college facility. Sidewalks and crosswalks along residential streets leading to the site are available to minimize any pedestrian/bicyclist hazards.

XV. UTILITIES AND SERVICE SYSTEMS

(Items a-g) -Additional use of regional electrical supplies due to the project is unavoidable and considered insignificant. Electrical services are already provided by Edison to the project site and will be upgraded to serve the new addition. The energy conservation efforts pursued and implemented by the District are very progressive and reflective of the best energy conserving technology available. Installing water-low flow toilets, shower and faucet flow restrictions, and other water conserving appliances can minimize the project water demand upon the water supply system

Storm drain maintenance service will be provided through the City of Victorville. The project will be constructed with public funds and will comply with off-street improvements and public utility hookups, pursuant to the State Allocation Board policy, Storm Water Management Program, and State and Federal law.

XVI. MANDATORY FINDING OF SIGNIFICANCE

The proposed project will not have the potential to degrade the habitat of fish or wildlife species. It will not cause the fish or wildlife population to drop below self-sustaining levels, threaten to eliminate a plant or animal community, reduce the number or restrict the range of a rare or endangered plant or animal or eliminate important examples of the major periods of California history or prehistory.

This proposed project would not have the potential to achieve the short-term environmental goals to the disadvantage of long-term environmental goals. The proposed project will not result in an impact that is individually limited but cumulatively considerable. The project will not result in significant adverse impacts within the surrounding developments.

The construction of this new facility will not have environmental effects that will cause substantial adverse effects on human beings either directly or indirectly.

The Project Director or designee will monitor all of the mitigation measures described herein. An inspector approved by the Division of State Architect will be on site during all phases of construction and will monitor grading and construction activities.

Negative Declaration:

It has been determined that based on the current authorized use approved for this property, the above project will not have a significant effect on the environment for the following reasons:

- 1. It does not affect any rare or endangered species;
- 2. It does not cause interference with the movement of any resident migratory fish or wildlife species.
- 3. It does not breach any published national, state or local standards relating to solid waste or litter control.
- 4. It does not result in detrimental effects on air or water quality or on ambient noise levels for adjoining areas.
- 5. It does not involve the possibility of contaminating the public water system or adversely affecting ground water;
- 6. It could not cause substantial flooding, erosion or siltation; and
- 7. The project will not individually or collectively have an adverse effect on wildlife species, as defined in Section 711.2 of the California Fish and Game Code.

Mitigations:

The following mitigation measures will be a part of this project:

- 7. Fire hydrant, fire alarms, sprinkler systems and firewalls will be installed as required by the State Fire Marshal.
- 8. Fire truck access and adequate turning radius for fire equipment will be maintained.
- 9. The additional facilities will utilize current principles of energy and water conservation, including but not limited to, water-conserving plumbing fixtures, energy efficient lighting systems, double-glazed windows, and insulation.
- 10. The new buildings will be submitted to the Division of the State Architect for approval and will comply with all criteria and regulations affecting educational facilities including geological/seismic design safety features required by Title 24 (Field Act) and current building codes.
- 11. District will pursue a program of soil sampling and analysis to assess the presence of chemically persistent agricultural chemicals. All soil samplings should generally conform to DTSC guidelines for assessment of former agricultural properties discrete soil samples should be collected and analyzed for organochlorine pesticides and CAM metals. Following the completion of the analysis the District will take any actions necessary to comply with all regulations or guidelines as may be recommended prior to the construction of the facility.
- 12. A District mitigation-monitoring program for all mitigation measures will be implemented.

Monitoring Plan:

A District mitigation-monitoring program encompassing all of the mitigation measures identified will be implemented under the supervision of Steve garcia, Director of Facilities of the Victor Valley Community College District or his designee. Documentation of the implementation of each of the mitigations will be created and maintained by the district.








EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report presents the findings of a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA), conducted by Hydrologue, Inc. (HI) for an approximately 1-acre vacant property located north of Bear Valley Road and west of Mojave Fish Hatchery Road, on the Victor Valley Community College (VVCC) campus in the City of Victorville, San Bernardino County in California (the Site). The Site is a portion of the 216-acre Assessor's Parcel Number 0482-022-06. The Site is presently vacant, undeveloped land. The VVCC plans to build a gymnasium building at the Site. During the course of this investigation, HI made all appropriate due diligence inquiries into previous ownership and usage of the Site in accordance with the Superfund Authorization and Reorganization Amendments (SARA) 42 USC §9601 (35)(A) (also known as the "Innocent Landowner Defense"). During the course of this investigation, Hydrologue, Inc. made appropriate due diligence inquiries into the previous ownership and uses of the Site, consistent with good commercial customary practice, in an effort to minimize the exposure to liability of the Client, in accordance with the Superfund Authorization and Reorganization Amendments (SARA) 42 USC § 9601 (35)(A) (known generally as the "Innocent Landowner Defense"). In addition, the materials gathered for this report were prepared in accordance with and based on the objectives outlined in the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) "Standard Practice for Environmental Site Assessments" Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Process, E-1527-00" (current edition) guidelines.

This due diligence investigation was conducted to evaluate the potential for degradation of the Site environmental integrity, as a result of potential past or present hazardous materials used at the Site and its vicinity. Current land use practices including the use of hazardous materials within a radius of up to one mile of the Site were investigated. Historical land usage was also researched in the immediate site area.

The following summarizes information obtained by HI during the performance of this Phase I environmental assessment:

- The Site (proposed gymnasium) is an approximately 1-acre vacant property located north of Bear Valley Road and west of Mojave Fish Hatchery Road, in the City of Victorville, San Bernardino County in California. The Site is a portion of the 216-acre Assessor's Parcel Number 0482-022-06. The Site consists of relatively flat and level undeveloped land. Vegetation was minimal consisting of a stand of conifers along the northern portion of the Site and sparse seasonal weeds and grasses. Shallow tire ruts and tracks were observed throughout the Site. A concrete culvert runs under East Campus Road in the northwest portion of the Site.
- Based on the information gathered for this report, the Site had been used for agriculture from at 1954 until 1975. The Site has been vacant land with natural vegetation since at least 1978 though 2004.

- Based on the aerial photographs observed, the subject Site does not appear to have been developed. Agricultural use is apparent from at least 1954 until 1975. The Site has been vacant land with natural vegetation since at least 1978 though 2004.
 - According to Reference 1, the earliest stereoscopic aerial photographs reviewed (1938) showed the site to be to be unimproved with evidence of over bank deposits from the Mojave River. Later photographs (1953) showed the Site to be in use as agricultural fields. Abandonment of agricultural activities and the development of Victor Valley College are visible on the 1974 aerial photographs. The area appeared unchanged on the 1983 aerial photographs. Development of East Campus Road is apparent on the 1994 aerial photographs. The area appeared unchanged on the 2005 aerial photographs.
- There was no Sanborn Fire Insurance Map coverage available for the Site.
- No ASTs or USTs were observed at the Site during our Site walk-through. No current or historical permits for ASTs or USTs related to the Site were found in the course of our research with various departments of the City of Victorville. The San Bernardino County Fire Department, Hazards Materials Division was contacted regarding above and underground fuel storage tanks for the subject property; they indicated that they transferred their responsibility to the Victorville Fire Department. The Victorville Fire Department indicated that they do not have any record for the Site (Appendix C). However During interview Mr. Garcia indicated that the VVCC formerly operated a 6,000-gallon gasoline UST at the maintenance building. The tank was closed by removal 6-8 years ago and no indications of a release were noted. The VVCC currently operates two 350-gallon ASTs at the maintenance building (Appendix E).

The Mojave Air Quality Management District was contacted by HI regarding records for the Site. Barbara Weese of Mojave office indicated in writing that there were records (Permit to Operate) for the Campus (Appendix H).

• According to the environmental record search, no air emission facilities are listed within a one-half mile radius of the Site, The Mojave Air Quality Management District was contacted by HI regarding records for the Site. Barbara Weese of Mojave office indicated in writing that there were records (Permit to Operate) for the Campus, and for air emission facilities within ¼-mile of the Site (Appendix H).

- According to DOG map and the Munger Map Book, there are no oil or gas wells located at the Site or within one-mile radius of the Site.
- During the Site walkthrough, no motor, hydraulic, cutting or other industrial oils or hazardous materials were observed at the Site.

The San Bernardino County Fire Department, Hazards Materials Division was contacted regarding hazardous material storage at the subject Site; they indicated that they transferred their responsibility to the Victorville Fire Department. The Victorville Fire Department indicated that they do not have any record for the Site (Appendix C).

During interview Mr. Garcia indicated that the VVCC science lab, health center, and maintenance buildings do generate small quantities of wastes that are drummed and stored at the maintenance building (located greater than 1,000 feet northeast of the Site) until properly disposed of. None of these facilities is located adjacent to the Site. Mr. Garcia also indicated the VVCC formerly operated a 6,000-gallon gasoline UST at the maintenance building. The tank was closed by removal 6-8 years ago and no indications of a release were noted. The VVCC currently operates two 350-gallon ASTs at the maintenance building (Appendix E).

According to Stephen Garcia, Director of Facilities Construction and Contracts of VVCC, the Site and remainder of the approximately 216-acre parcel was acquired from a rancher in the early 1960s for development of the college. He indicated that the lake in the central portion of campus was built by the rancher. The Site was never developed by VVCC, but was used for overflow parking at various events. Mr. Garcia indicated that adjacent structures included a gym to the north, modular classrooms to the east and a student activity center and student services buildings to the west, and no hazardous materials or hazardous wastes were used or stored on the Site or these adjacent buildings. Mr. Garcia indicated that the VVCC science lab, health center, and maintenance buildings do generate small quantities of wastes that are drummed and stored at the maintenance building (located greater than 1,000 feet north of the Site) until properly disposed of. None of these facilities is located adjacent to the Site. Mr. Garcia also indicated the VVCC formerly operated a 6,000-gallon gasoline UST at the maintenance building. The tank was closed by removal 6-8 years ago and no

indications of a release were noted. The VVCC currently operates two 350-gallon ASTs at the maintenance building. Mr. Garcia also indicated by phone on October 19, 2005 that there are no records regarding pesticide use for the proposed Gymnasium Site.

During our brief walkthrough no visible or olfactory evidence of the storage or disposal of hazardous wastes; chemical or hazardous material spills; pesticide or herbicides storage or use; stained soil or pools of liquid; discoloration, stressed vegetation, or dead or ill wildlife; existing USTs or ASTs; monitoring, supply and/or disposal wells, or hummocky topography at the Site or adjacent to the Site.

- The Site is not listed in any of the searched regulatory databases. However the campus was listed in permitted underground storage tanks, Hazardous waste information Systems, Emergency response Notification System, Well investigation program and drinking water program.
- No releases of hazardous substances to the air, soil or groundwater were reported at the Site but a release in campus was reported in the Emergency response Notification System list.
- Four permitted UST facilities are reportedly located within a one-half mile radius of the Site. None is located at the Site but two of facilities are reportedly located within the campus.
- Two Leaking underground storage tanks are listed within one mile of the Site.
- Based on the fact that there are no structures at the Site, the potential for existence of ACM and LBP at the Site is considered nil. Because the Site is not adjacent to any freeways, the potential for existence of lead-impacted shallow soil from vehicle exhaust is also considered nil.
- The California State Fire Marshal has indicated that there are no oil pipelines under their jurisdiction at the Site.

Recommendations:

Based on the historic agricultural use of the property from at least 1954 until 1975 Hydrologue recommends a program of soil sampling and analysis to assess the presence of chemically persistent agricultural chemicals. Soil sampling and analysis should generally conform to DTSC guidelines for assessment of former agricultural properties. Discrete soil samples should be collected and analyzed for organochlorine pesticides and metals.
